The specific aim of this animal research project was to determine if a new instrument designed for BioElectric Field Imaging (BFI) can be used for the diagnosis of melanomas by measuring local perturbations in the electric fields in skin near the melanoma. Our hypothesis was that melanomas exhibit increased rates of cell division and this could lead to a reduction in the local transepidermal resistance that could be manifested as a local electric field perturbation. C57Bl/6 mice are a standard model system for testing potential treatments for or diagnosis of melanoma. Tumors were induced using B16 murine melanoma cells.

In vitro studies on other tumors suggest that the cell cycle regulators p27 and p16 may be critical for the regulation of cell cycle by hypoxia. However, p16 is deleted in the majority of primary melanomas and melanoma cell lines. Therefore, it was necessary to initially screen a

number of melanoma cell lines primarily for aberrations in these cell cycle regulators. We identified 2 cell lines for subsequent studies based on their p27 and p16 status, A2058 (p27⁺/p16⁺) and SK-MEL-31 (p27⁺/p16⁻).

Both cell lines were cultured under conditions of normoxia and hypoxia (2% O₂) over a range of time points (2-72 hours). Total RNA and protein were extracted from all samples.

Using Western blot analysis, we identified changes in the protein levels of the cell cycle regulators, p27 and pRB, as a consequence of hypoxia. p27 and hypophosphorylated pRB protein levels increased at 24 hours of hypoxia.

Novel array analysis was on protein and RNA samples from both cell lines, harvested following culture for 24 hours of normoxia and hypoxia. Protein samples were analyzed using the BD ClontechTM Ab Microarray 500 (BD Biosciences). With this array, we simultaneously analyzed over 500 cellular proteins involved signal transduction, cell-cycle regulation, gene transcription, and apoptosis. RNA samples were analyzed by cDNA macroarray analysis using GEArray Q Series Human Cell Cycle Gene ArrayTM (Bioscience Corporation). Through a simple side-by-side hybridization, we determined simultaneously the transcription profile of 96 genes involved in cell cycle regulation. Results demonstrated differential expression and/or transcription of cell cycle regulators as a consequence of hypoxia. These techniques will allow screening of multiple genes at once, identifying particular genes for further study.

Several lines of evidence indicate that increased oxidative stress is an important pathogenic mechanism in numerous chronic inflammatory and degenerative diseases. Heme oxygenase (HO-1) is a key cytoprotective enzyme that is expressed in virtually all cell types, including skin cells and melanocytes (the cell of origin of MM). HO-1 is up-regulated by numerous stressful stimuli, such as oxidative and other chemical and physical stressors. Recent data have shown that skin cells, melanocytes, hepatocytes, and other cells respond to acute injury with an increased expression of HO-1. A recent report from Austria suggested that subjects with short GT repeats had increased risk for development and progression of MM (Okamoto I et al. Intl J Cancer, Epub ahead of print, 4 April 2006. This important finding needs confirmation in larger numbers of genetically

- more diverse subjects. The goals and objectives of our study included: 1) To determine whether there is a clinically important and statistically significant difference in the length of GT repeats in the heme oxygenase-1 (*HO-1*) gene promoter in subjects with malignant melanoma (MM) vs. age-, sex, and sun-exposure matched controls without MM; 2) To determine whether there are clinically important, statistically significant differences in the length of GT repeats in the *HO-1* gene promoter in patients with MM with more advanced, rapidly progressive disease than in patients with MM with less-advanced disease. Hypotheses: Persons with short GT repeats (which in other studies have been correlated with higher levels of HO-1 expression) have lower risks of developing MM. If such persons do develop MM, they are less likely to succumb to the disease.

In these studies, the diagnostic accuracy of MelaFind and the study dermatologists will be evaluated. The reference standard will be the final interpretation of the lesions by dermatohistopathology. The newest protocol is a roll-in study to establish experience with the MelaFind system for investigators participating in the previous protocols and is designed to provide proof of the safety and effectiveness for the use of MelaFind as an aid to dermatologists in evaluating pigmented lesions that have one or more characteristics of melanoma. The study parameters will be sharply focused to the following:
Effector response measured by: level of inflammatory infiltrate; Level of infiltration by CD8+ T cells, gamma interferon, TNF alpha.
Regulatory response measured by: CD4+and CD25+ T cells, IL-10, TGF-beta. Fox-P3.
- 2008: "Comparative epigenetic profiling of iPS cell bivalent domain reprogramming". Collaboration with Dr. Winfried Krueger, at Storrs (Principal Investigator) and Dr.Kuchel at UCONN Center on Aging (Co-investigator). The objectives are to: 1) assess the impact of lysine demethylation in bivalent chromatin domains from hESCs and human iPs cells on expression of select genes; 2) assess pluripotency as a function of bivalent domain Histone methylation patterns in hESCs and human iPS cells; 3) quantify variations in bivalent domain Histone methylation in iPS

cells from a cohort of both young and elderly volunteers. This research will generate results that contribute to the development of a comprehensive protocol for assessment of the reprogrammed cell suitability in clinical applications involving elderly patients. The project will utilize the hESC line WA09, a second high quality non-approved hESC line provided by the University of Connecticut Stem Cell Core and iPS cells generated in Dr. Krueger's laboratory. Stem cells will also be transplanted into SCID mice for teratoma production. The project will also make extensive use of the Solexa sequencing capabilities of the Translational Genomics Core.

- 2009. Pilot Study to Measure Serum Vit D Levels of Skin Cancer Patients. In collaboration with Dr. Phil Kerr and Karren Slade, APRN. Goal: to determine the serum Vitamin D status of skin cancer patients counseled to use sun protection and avoid sun exposure and to develop Vitamin D supplementation recommendations into our current standard of care.
- 2010: Novel type of “physiomarkers” to improve the approach to diagnosis of melanoma and other skin cancers: Partnering PI with Dr. Igor Sokolov, Professor of Physics, Chemical and Biomolecular Science and Director of Nanoengineering and Biotechnology Laboratories Center NABLAB at Clarkson University. We propose to develop a fundamentally new type of “physical” markers of skin cancers, which could be called “physiomarkers” of skin cancer. The physiomarker will allow the diagnosis of skin cancer without biopsy. The proposed biomarker will be based on the analysis of superficial skin cells (corneocytes), which are easy to collect with a simple sticky tape (so-called stripping method). The collected corneocytes will be imaged with atomic force microscopy (AFM). The obtained images will be analyzed with several surface parameters (chosen out of about 30 parameters used to characterize the surface (mostly in engineering), such as roughness, fractal dimensionality, screwness, etc.). The proposed physiomarker will then be volume defined in the space of the parameters characterizing the' corneocytes's surface. For example, if a set of the corneocytes's parameters belongs to that volume, the corneocytes have been collected from a malignant lesion. Such definition can easily and unambiguously be used in a computer processing of the collected data. We hypothesize that the proposed physiomarker will allow a fast diagnosis of melanoma and other skin cancers with accuracy.

- 2010-2012: In collaboration with Dr. Bijay Mukherji, Dr. Upendra Hegde and Dr. Soheil Dadras : Four goals:
 1. To undertake a critical examination of the functional integrity of T cells derived from the elderly (above 70 years of age) and young (below 65 years) through a comprehensive phenotypic and functional examination of their CD8+ and CD4+ T cells stimulated by their endogenous TCRs as

well as stimulated through a set of HLA-A2-restricted transgenic TCR bearing specificity for the melanoma epitope MART-127-35.

2. To carry out a comparative analysis of the CD4+ T cell-mediated regulatory activities in the young and the elderly hosts (healthy normal donors and hosts with a diagnosis of melanoma) in the MART-127-35 model.
3. To determine the nature of the immune responses (i.e., effector vs. regulatory) in primary melanomas in both cohorts, in situ.
4. To undertake a retrospective correlation of the history of the disease (progression or no progression) with the nature of the responses (i.e., effector vs. regulatory) in the primary tumors.

- 2010- present: Melanoma epigenetics and gene expression (Sam Dadras, MD, PhD – PI) (Collaborators include Stormy Chamberlain PhD, Richard Everson MD, Jane Grant-Kels MD, Dong-Guk Shin, PhD, E. Janet Hager PhD, David Han, PhD, Upendra Hegde MD, Michael Murphy MD, Helen Swede Phd, Henry Smilowitz PhD.)

This program is centered on understanding the epigenetic changes and alteration in gene expression leading to melanoma progression. The strength of this approach is its translational focus, where archived primary cutaneous melanoma specimens will be screened to discover cancer biomarkers (small RNA, messenger RNA and/or protein) in hopes of improving prognostication for melanoma patients. Then, we will dissect the genetic pathways of such biomarkers using reprogrammed adult stem cells, human cell lines and mouse models. In doing so, we aim to integrate translational with basic science as follows:

1. Induced reprogramming of melanoma cancer cells-recent advances in induced pluripotent stem (iPS) cells has changed the way cancer cells are studied. Through collaboration with experts in the Connecticut Stem Cell Institute, we will study the epigenetic changes in melanoma iPS cells
2. Next generation sequencing-new modalities and technology in nucleic acid sequencing has truly changed the way discoveries are made in Biology. We have utilized this technology to profile small RNAs and messenger RNA from archived melanoma specimen. We will deep-sequence archived melanomas and melanoma iPS cells in search of RNA biomarkers associated with disease progression and differentiation
3. Expression profiling-changes in the expression of messenger RNA and protein are critical for cancer development and progression. To develop a truly global understanding of changes in gene expression, we will collaborate with experts to correlate the changes in small RNA expression profile to those in messenger RNA and protein
 - a. mRNA, DSAL arrays
 - b. Protein, proteomics
4. Preclinical melanoma mouse models-Genetically engineered mouse models have provided a powerful genetic tool to dissect the genetic and

epigenetic pathways in human cancer development and progression. Through local and distant collaborations, we have developed a unique mouse model system recapitulating early melanoma metastasis to sentinel lymph node. Using this model and others, we will dissect epigenetic pathways of discovered cancer biomarkers in human melanoma.

Microbial sphingolipids are a new a class of membrane-derived glycolipids of great interest in malignancy and other disorders because of their varied biological activities and potential for therapeutic uses. The goal of this project is to demonstrate as proof of concept that sphingolipids, a family of microbial glycolipids, have anti-tumor activity against human melanoma cells, and that such activity may be demonstrated for other solid tumors. The proposed studies employ novel concepts and established methods of drug therapy to treat solid tumors. The development of glycolipid structural analogues with selective anti-tumor effects and low toxicity to normal cells can have very important therapeutic impact on the treatment of patients with treatment-resistant cancer. It is postulated that natural sphingolipids or select derivatives may be effective therapeutic agents against melanoma cells and perhaps other types of solid tumors. The study seeks to establish the anti-tumor effect *in vitro* when cells are treated with increasing concentrations of sphingolipid natural mixture or select derivatives (ethyl ester, methyl ester) for 14 days. Further, the anti-tumor effects will be established *in vivo* using a nude mouse model system with xenotransplanted human melanoma cells. This study is designed to determine effects on tumor growth, regression, and apoptosis. Proof of concept will be determined by at least 30% reduction in tumor growth *in vivo* after a minimum of two weeks. Further, at least 30% reduction of tumor cell growth *in vitro* is anticipated after a minimum of 24 hours. These expectations are based on preliminary results which demonstrated cytotoxicity of at least 30% with any of the sphingolipid mixtures or derivatives used to treat pancreatic cancer. Phase II studies will be designed to advance the development of the therapeutic agent toward submission of IND .

Examine the role of miRNAs in melanoma progression using FFPE melanomas and serum

Hypothesis: Certain miRNAs are ectopically expressed in melanoma, which maybe associated with a specific clinical behavior. Melanoma patients with specific clinical characteristics will have distinctive pattern(s) of miRNA expression that can be detected by NGS in the tumor or patient serum.

Methods: We will recruit patients identified retrospectively from tumor registries at UCHC, St. Francis and Hartford hospitals diagnosed with cutaneous melanoma from 2005 to 2010 with the following clinical scenarios for the study.

1. Major response to immunotherapy (IL2, IFN, ipi)
2. Long-term survival after resected metastatic disease
3. Presence of B-Raf mutations
4. Major response to chemotherapy (Temodar or DTIC)
5. Brain metastasis (controls include melanoma with no brain metastasis and carcinomas with brain metastasis)
6. Rapidly progressive metastatic disease
7. GI metastasis
8. Multiple loco-regional recurrences without metastasis

Paraffin blocks of biopsies/excisions from primary melanoma and matched metastases will be obtained from the hospital where the treatment took place. If serum is already available from these patients, it will be included in the study.

The following will be accomplished:

- 1) Genotyping melanomas for BRAF and NRAS mutations
- 2) Small RNA isolation from FFPE
- 3) Determining RNA integrity in FFPE and FF specimens
- 4) Constructing small RNA libraries
- 5) Deep-sequencing
- 6) TaqMan miRNA assay
- 7) Data analysis- We will use NextGENe's Sequence Operation Tool to trim the linker sequences from the ends of reads.
